Community Events

Riverview Winter Carnival 2019

Winter Carnival was a huge success again this year, as it experiences a continued growth in citizen participation as well as corporate and not for profit engagement. Although the weather was cold for the **Ignite Opening Ceremonies** and attendance was down slightly, it remained well attended and Winter Wonderland Park seen substantial activity over the 10 day event.

The River of Pride event, "Out in the Cold", highlighting sexual and gender diversity saw a 75% increase in attendance over last year's first event of its kind in Riverview.

Additional equipment was on **loan from ParaNB** this year, to better facilitate people of all abilities to participate in outdoor activities. In addition to the hockey sledges on loan for the past two Winter Carnivals, there were a sit-ski, a snow-coach and curling sticks available. Tango Medical Supplies assisted with facilitating the use of the equipment and also partnered with Pickle Planet to help with promoting not only the fact that we are offering these accessible opportunities, but to help with promotion of the Winter Carnival in general. Wheelchair accessible parking was also designated.

The Aquatic Centre hosted a free workshop "Family Swim to Survive", on Feb 10th in conjunction with Winter Carnival's *Learn* theme. The workshop engaged children and families to learn and practice the basic skills to survive an unexpected fall into open water. The Winter Carnival movie was "Small Foot" and was filled to capacity, with just under 300 people attending.

The Snowflake Skate seen approximately 200 people comprised mainly of families with young children. This is about three times the number that attended the Christmas skate. The synchronized skating team performed which was well received.

The Mayor's Luncheon was filled to capacity with only a few cancellations, which were filled with others from the wait list.

Skate Park

The skate park **c**ontinues to provide a safe, supervised environment for youth. January saw an increase in visitors from other provinces. The majority of visitors/skaters were 12 years of age and up. There were a number of All Ages skate events scheduled during February, which seen an increase in the number of new people attending, making for a busy time, however staff were happy to get new users. The Frozen Open Competition during Winter Carnival had 26 competitors (12 Intermediate and 14 Advanced). They came from all over the Maritimes including: Summerside, Charlottetown, Saint John, Bathurst, and Fredericton.



Winter Trails & Activities

Town crews continue grooming the walking trails along Gunningsville Blvd, Pine Glen and Riverfront Park. This year's extension of snow clearing on the Riverfront to Muncey Drive is working well, as is the inclusion of Sawgrass and Old Coach and other selected linkages with the assistance of Public Works crews. Staff is gradually increasing capacity to groom all our trails year over year. As well, the Cross Country Trails (classic and skate) and the snow shoe/Fat Bike trails are regularly groomed at Mill Creek Nature Park and is experiencing significant use. The local Fat biking group is also conducting weekly rides at the Park and community volunteers are assisting regular Town crews with grooming.

Winter Wonderland Park is in full swing with the skating oval, sliding hill and snowboarding facility seeing significant use. A local snowboarding group is grooming the snowboarding side of the hill in partnership with the department's maintenance crews. Recent cold and rainy weather has forced closures of the hill for short periods for user safety.

Planning for the Future

PCMAC

The Grade 5 Water polo program began Jan 8th and will run for 10 weeks. This program provides the opportunity for all grade 5 classes in Riverview to experience water polo first hand through school-to-school matches.

Facility Improvements

The Aquatic Coordinator, the Manager of Recreation Facilities & Assets and the Parks Foreman reviewed the recently published *New Brunswick Public Pool Safety Standards* to identify areas of improvement for the aquatic centre. This document is the first time in the province that best practices and recommendations have been identified. This will be a continuous process with a focus upon risk management and factuality of the centre.

Art Procurement

Barbara DeNieverville has agreed to be the new "artist" member and Gwen Dixon has agreed to be the new community member of the Art Procurement Committee. Mike Molnar is remaining on the committee as the other community member. Committee planning meetings are expected to be scheduled in the near future.

	Community Garden Registration for the 2019 season has been open to returning users and the general public. As of Feb. 14th, 2019, 30 of 40 in ground plots and 12 of 20 raised beds have been rented.
	Friends of Mill Creek Advisory Committee Friends of Mill Creek continue to meet monthly to provide a venue for community engagement and plan for the future of the park. Currently there is discussion, and individual members looking at the possibility of, constructing an Natural Playground in the area of the Lookout, engaging the local elementary schools in a pollinator garden project, planning an annual Bio blitz through the high school for the entire community to participate, and looking at the potential for a public education project addressing the growing conflict between various user groups using the Park for their activities (walkers, skiers, Fat Bikers, etc.).
