	Overall April was an eventful month with Maple Festival and Easter events. The skate park hosted a community 'maple themed' potluck and all ages skate, as well as an Easter Extravaganza including a giant Easter egg hunt. There were lots of first time faces into the facility who have all returned several times since their first visits. With spring hockey, maple fest events next door, as well as a market, there were several walk ins who were simply in the area and were curious about what was inside. In addition to regular operations, staff was busy planning a Star Wars Themed event for Youth Week in Canada on May 4 th .

Section 3: Other Notable Development & Highlights for Council's Attention

Staff Development

February 7th, 2019: Arena Training

All arena staff attended the Mid-season Ice Maintenance Seminar Thursday, February 7th at the Kay Arena in Moncton, NB. This one-day seminar was designed specifically for those in the arena industry and has become an integral part of the training of arena personnel throughout the Maritimes. The Mid-season Ice Maintenance Seminar is an integral part of the overall professional development for those in the arena industry. The information obtained from this workshop is put to use immediately.

May 23/24: Community Recreation Worker – Aquatics is attending 2 trainings in Halifax: Aquatic Management Certificate: For recreation professionals responsible for overseeing the operation of aquatic facilities, this 10 hour training program provides the knowledge required to provide a safe aquatic environment

S.E.E. Auditor Training: Supervision Evaluation and Enhancement course is designed to give individuals the knowledge, training and tools required to evaluate the safety of lifeguard and instructor supervision using a quantifiable measuring system.

April 16/17: Both full time Aquatic staff attended the 2nd Canadian Red Cross Atlantic Swimposium held at the City of Dieppe. The 2 day event included keynote speakers from across Canada and several certification courses in Water Safety and Instructor Development. A large number of supervisory staff from around the Maritimes attended to discuss common trends and challenges in the aquatic industry. **April 28**: PCMAC hosted a regional Aqua fitness Instructor workshop in partnership with Fitness NB and AQX-Training Programs. The workshop seen 18 instructors from across Atlantic Canada use PCMAC for professional development and recertification.

April 27: Both full time aquatic employees will be attended the Lifesaving Society of NB's 51st AGM, where they accepted an award on behalf of the town: "Largest Lifesaving Program in the Province for a Municipality under 20,000 Residents" for 2018. Scoring is point based and relates to participation in swimming lessons and certification courses delivered.

Youth

On Thursday, May 2, a tri-community youth discussion was held at Moncton City Hall. The goal of this discussion was to facilitate a conversation between youth advisory groups from the three communities (Riverview, Moncton and Dieppe) in our area. The discussion was split into several different sections and focussed on a variety of topics relevant to both the communities at large, and youth's impact on current issues. The Community Recreation Worker-Youth and the skate park/community centre operator were also in attendance representing Riverview.

The first topic of conversation was the uniqueness of each community. The youth from Riverview described the value in having nature surrounding our town. Having accessible walking trails and the centralization of most of our green areas such as Mill Creek Nature Park was seen as a good quality to have, especially with the increase many kids are seeing in their "screen time" (cellphone, tablet). Another unique quality of Riverview that the youth discussed was the experience they can receive through the Town's Junior Leadership program. They discussed the importance of gaining both life skills and work experience that the program offers. The groups from Moncton and Dieppe were very curious and expressed their desire to have similar programs made available in their cities.

Also discussed was the banning of single use plastic bags. All groups agreed there is certainly a need to ban all single use plastic bags due to the negative effect they are having on the environment. The entirety of the room agreed they would fully support a ban, however one youth from Riverview voiced his concern about small businesses not being able to afford the extra cost of paper bags.

When asked how the three communities collaborate with youth, and ways they might be able to improve on collaboration, everyone agreed that there currently isn't enough of a partnership formed between the three tri-community areas. The types of discussions they were currently having were seen as a giant step towards a more joint effort regarding different issues that affect youth. The discussion was a success and there are plans to make this time of collaboration more frequent.

Please note: Riverview doesn't not currently have an active Mayor's Youth Advisory Group however department staff contacted youth actively involved in our community, most have been Junior Leaders and /or summer P&R staff, to come together and represent Riverview at the tri community meeting.
