A Safe and Welcoming Community	<p>Community Events</p> <p>Program Registration Summer registration was held on May 30th for the 60+ programs and adult fitness programs. Seventy per cent of the registrations were completed online.</p> <p>Summer Swim Splash into Summer Swim is a summer kick-off swim event on June 27, 2019 from 1:00-4:30 pm, hosted annually at the Lion Ken Gabbey Pool. The event includes a free swim, inflatables, children's activities, treats and a cash barbeque hosted by the Riverview Lion's Club.</p> <p>PCMAC June 4th, 2019 was the 40th anniversary of the Riverview Aquatic Centre's opening in 1979. The aquatic centre's Spring schedule is finished on June 26th, with summer hours beginning June 27th. Summer staff will be completing 12 hours of training from June 25-26. The Lion Ken Gabbey Community Pool will open for the season on June 27th (1:30-4:30pm). The facility is open until 7 pm during regular season, beginning July 2. The couple days before</p>

Planning for the Future	<p>Community Garden</p> <p>The annual Community Garden information session for registrants was held at the Riverview Library and it went well. Staff reviewed information regarding the garden plots, registration forms were filled out, and copies of the Garden rules handed out. Staff presented a Power Point with slides of the garden and other related information. There were about 30 garden members in attendance. Lisa MacLeod has since joined the garden committee.</p> <p>There are partnerships and plans in place for a salsa garden seeing the Outdoor Adventure campers tending and then making salsa later this summer. , a mini seed library (with school coordinator and Rotary club) Darlene Taylor the Community Schools Coordinator for Riverview/Riverside Albert, who is also is a garden committee member informed us that the Rotary Club provides mini libraries. Staff has followed up and is arranging to meet to get a mini seed/resource library. This has been on the committee's list for a while. For the workshop John MacLaughlin of Riverview Lawns & Gardens is presenting a session on companion planting and he will answer any general questions gardeners may have.
