Administration	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The TMR radio project was fully implemented on December 21st. This facilitates vastly improved radio coverage, and clear radio communications for firefighters. Operational review is complete and will be presented to Council in February 2023. This information will support a revised Strategic Plan for the department.
Operations	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Total call volumes for Riverview Fire and Rescue increased 39% in 2022 compared to 2021. This includes a 50% increase in medical calls. This aligns with other fire departments in the Moncton region. A full review of Administrative and Operational SOGs commenced. This project will carry over into 2023. Candidates were interviewed for volunteer firefighter positions. Those moving ahead in the process will commence training in January. Meetings held with Volunteer Captains to review performance policies and procedures related to volunteer membership and attendance.

Fire Prevention & Education Report	<p><u>Fire Inspections</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There was a total of one (1) fire safety inspection conducted in November, this was for a in home daycare. • Performed three re-inspections in December one was for two apartment buildings inspected in October and a In-home daycare that was inspected that required a re-visit. <p><u>Fire Prevention & Education</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Crews attended a day care and performed a fire truck tour and fire safety talk. • There were two fire station tours one of grade two students and the other was teenagers from Boys & Girls club. <p><u>Fire Investigation</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There were four (4) fires in November & December, requiring investigation.
