

# Tri-Community Municipal Emergency Measures Plan

# **Background**

- This Municipal Emergency Measures Plan is an update to the original approved by the Riverview, Moncton and Dieppe Councils in 2018.
- This plan is issued by Council, under the authority of the *New Brunswick Emergency Measures Act*.
- This is categorized as an "all hazards plan".







## **Context**

Emergency Management involves four phases:

- 1. Mitigation
- 2. Preparedness
- 3. Response
- 4. Recovery

An Emergency Response Plan is at the heart of the preparedness phase and is a valuable tool in the response and recovery phases.







## **Plan Contents**

#### Part 1- General Information

• Includes phases of emergency operations, levels of responsibility and authorities.

#### Part 2- Municipal Response/Actions

• Includes as summary of various hazards assessed on history, vulnerability, maximum threat and probability of occurrence.







#### **Plan Contents**

Part 3- Roles and Responsibilities during Activation

• This section includes activation levels as well as the roles and responsibilities of various parties in an emergency (i.e. Incident Commander, Municipality, etc.)

Part 4- Definitions

Note: Parts 1-4 largely involved only housekeeping changes.







## **Plan Contents**

#### Part 5- Appendixes

- This area of the plan includes substantive change and improvements.
- A standard form for the declaration, and termination, of a State of Local Emergency (based on the *Emergency Measures Act*).
- A standard form for evacuation advisories.







# State of Local Emergency

- When a municipality is satisfied that an emergency exists or may exist in all or any area of the municipality, it may declare a state of local emergency in respect of the municipality or the area of the municipality.
- Council approval is required to declare a state of local emergency.







# Public Role in Preparedness

- Emergencies are best managed at the local level. As a result, municipalities have an important role to play.
- The public should also prepare for emergencies, which includes being able to take care of yourself and your family for the first 72 hours after an emergency.
