- **50th Anniversary Grants** we have received a total of 12 applications so far, the majority of which qualify for the grant. We are in the process of letting the applicants know.
- **Promotional budget** From the 1000 50th anniversary pins we have 200 left We are ordering 2000 more. 300 were given out at the Mayor's luncheon, 200 at the Levee, 60 for the Veterans. some were given out to the 50th committee and TOR staff. As well some were given out to each councillor to give out as they see fit.
- **50**th **banners** were made by Futura and were set to go up along Coverdale Road and Gunningsville Blvd.
- Indigenous Art The Town has reached out to two indigenous artist and there may be a "quill: workshop held during SUNFEST. As well another artist may be creating a painting or mural for the celebration.
- *Time Capsule* The committee is helping to decide what should go into the TOR's time capsule. We may also have other time capsule containers for sale where residents could purchase their own and fill it. This would be kept somewhere secure until the RRC is built to be stored there, then opened in 50 years. This would also be a fundraiser possibility for the RRC build.
- **Geocoin** the Town is in contact with the geocaching creators for the 50th logo on one side and potentially the tidal bore on the other side. Looking to have this take place during SUNFEST and into July.
- **Awards Gala** Nominations are coming in and plans for the evening are well underway. Currently, there are 10 youth nominations.
- **July 5** This kick off concert will be 50th themed with local musicians, cake, promote a self-serve trivia, scavenger hunt type event that people can do with their families on July 9th and then enter their names for a chance to win some 50th swag.
- **During Brain Freeze Trivia Night** an all-Riverview category was used to commemorate the 50th anniversary.
