# **WEDNESDAY WALKERS**

• There are over 80 folks that have registered to receive updates about this program. The group has moved indoors at the Riverview Community Hall on Wednesday afternoons at 1 p.m. With a regular group having developed, they also go for coffee at Damascus after their walk.

# **GUIDED MAPLE WALKS**

 On March 31, two groups of folks ages 60+ enjoyed an inclusive guided walk in Mill Creek Nature Park with a local mushroom expert. Total number of participants was 32.

#### **RISE AND MAPLE**

 On Saturday, April 2, staff and volunteers provided maple coffee, hot chocolate and Briggs Maple S'mores on the Dobson Trail for folks of all ages. This classic MapleFest event was attended by over 100 community members, the first time since pre-Covid. One gentleman in attendance told us he was so happy this event happened again- he had been waiting for years to participate.

#### 50th ANIVERSARY

- **50**<sup>th</sup> **banners** were produced and mounted.
- A few more applications came in after the deadline which will be considered with the next round which opens on April 20.

#### **SKATEPARK**

• *March break* was busy this year. The facility saw visitors from PEI and NS in addition to regulars from NB. Programming focussed on preparations for MapleFest, Easter, and Youth Week. MapleFest- budget was increased to allow for a wide variety of prizes for the participants.

#### PARKS AND RECREATION YOUTH DROP-IN PROGRAM

 Attendance at a variety of activities including: mobile game night, badminton, boardgames, basketball, open gym, BINGO, Family Feud, table-top games, etc. was pretty evenly distributed amongst the activities and the evening (Wednesdays and Saturdays) averaging about 14 per session.

# Building a Sustainable Community

#### **50TH ANNIVERSARY GRANTS**

• The first round of grant applications ended on March 20 and is for events taking place until June. The second round will open on April 20 for events taking place in the second half of the year.

#### **MARKETING**

 March 29th also offered a unique opportunity to showcase both the Drop-in Program and Riverview Skatepark and Youth Centre as we had over 60 youth from RMS visit the facility. The classes spent the morning receiving a beginner's skateboard lesson and enjoying the features of the Drop-in Program and Youth Centre. The classes were sent the digital copy of April's drop-in calendar posted at townofriverview.ca/youthdropin.



• To note- only 7 of the over 60 students had ever been to our facility. There are reportedly more RMS teachers interested in bringing their students to the skatepark/youth centre.

#### **COMMUNITY GARDEN**

- 2023 Growing Season:
  - As of April 17, the community garden only has one available garden plot remaining, with all other raised and in-ground plots reserved by local community gardeners.
  - A seed saving and crop rotation plan has been established for the 2023 season.
  - A seed saving workshop was held on March 17, which was full with a
    waiting list. Upcoming workshops are also either full or near full.

#### Greenhouse:

\$3,500 was received from Horizon's Community Innovation Grant, which
will go towards the purchase of a new greenhouse. This will be an
incredible asset to the community, as a teaching area and a means to
support the efforts of local gardeners both new and old who lack access to
such a space to facilitate their sustainable food production efforts for their
households.

#### **CLEAN UP MONTH**

• We are kicking off Earth Day, April 22, with a month long clean up initiative. We are asking businesses, groups, and individuals to put together a team and register to clean up a specific area of town. Complimentary clean up supply kits are available at the Parks & Recreation office, and individuals will be entered into a draw for eco-friendly prizes. Winners will be announced at our Zero-Waste Community Clean up Celebration on May 24 at the Coverdale Community Garden. The BBQ is a thank you to our participants and a chance to learn about local environmental initiatives.

Paulette also set up a meeting with their school intervention and settlement worker to meet and discuss youth week and brought them over to the skatepark facility to meet the team and have a tour. **RIVERVIEW MAPLEFEST** Riverview 14th Annual MapleFest was held from Friday, March 31 to Sunday, April 2, and was by far the most active and engaged MapleFest that Riverview has hosted to date. With 24 Riverview businesses hosting maple specials, events or experiences, and 20 community events being held over the three-day festival, there was something for everyone. Our CEW- Sustainability featured a backyard maple tapping instructional video series over the course of the weekend, which garnered a whooping 8.2K views! Service Excellence

#### **UPCOMING 60+ PROGRAMS:**

#### **PARTICIPACTION GRANT**

Park staff received great news this month that the facility was awarded a \$5000 grant from
Participaction to provide active programming activities throughout the month of June. These
funds will be used to offer several free skateboard programs focused on engaging equity
deserving groups such as adults, newcomers to the community, females, and LGBTQIA+
communities. Any remaining funds will be used to fund some adaptive skateboarding
equipment for the park. Staff will be preparing a schedule for the month of June.

#### **UPCOMING EVENTS/PROGRAMMING**

• **Youth Week Event**- Wednesday May 3, 2023, 6-9pm- In celebration of National Youth Week in Canada, the skatepark team are planning a free open skate with live music playing in the park.
