# **YOUTH SECTION**

- The Riverview Youth Collective continued to meet on a bi-weekly basis throughout the month of October. The group focussed on the Halloween events that were coming up, as well as planning for Light up Riverview. The team prepared 150 treat bags which would be handed out at the Halloween skate on October 29th in the Upper Arena. In addition to handing out treats, the Youth Collective dressed in costumes as they greeted visitors, explained rules of the public skate and emceed the event using their own family-friendly Halloween playlist.
- **Preparations for Light-up Riverview** will be the groups focus moving into November, as the students will be helping in organizing a scavenger hunt along the Riverfront Trail for the younger children while helping out at various booths/tables during the event.

### **PROGRAMMING**

- The Parks and Recreation YOUth Drop-In Program restarted on October 4. The Program will run on Wednesday 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. and Saturday from 6:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.
- Following up on discussions with Mayor LeBlanc's Youth Network meeting regarding the issue of food insecurity among youth in Town, we have opened talks with multiple local businesses about sponsoring meal nights during Youth Drop-Ins. In doing so, we have received an incredible amount of support from a variety of restaurants and businesses looking to help. Next steps are to cement the details and logistics of serving these meals each Wednesday, or every second Wednesday starting in the New Year. Riverview Youth Collective members have expressed their interest in helping to plate and serve meals during these evenings.

### REMEMBERANCE DAY

• The Town assisted the Riverview Veterans Association with their Remembrance Day service at the Immaculate Heart of Mary church, which was a full house, followed by a reception held at the Coverdale Centre, for veterans and their immediate family's.

# **SKATEPARK AND YOUTH CENTRE**

- October is a very busy month. The skatepark Halloween setup (generally takes around two weeks of preparation for the display) and the Rampocalypse event. This year's theme was 'The Bone Yard' taken from a skate spot in a popular Tony Hawk skateboard game and a great name for the facility's skeleton themethis year.
- This month has also brought back busier attendance at the facility with Wednesday evenings and Sunday afternoons being exceptionally busy. Also, important to note is that the youth centre is being used regularly on Wed, Thurs, Fri and Saturday evenings.

# **Service Excellence**

## **INFRASTRUCTURE**

- *The sports fields* received their fall treatments and are now ready to be put to bed for winter.
- *The Play4All playground project* is almost complete. All playground equipment has been installed with some outdoor furniture remaining.
- Flower beds have been winterized and planters have been picked up and taken

- **RAC Sign at Gunningsville Bridge** has been refurbished as part of it's asset management plan.
- *The ramp system* for both surfaces at the arena is expected be completed by the end of the November.

### RIVERVIEW RECREATION COMPLEX

- **Updated Design** and costing was presented to Council on November 14 with the completion of facility's construction documents.
- A prequalification process has recently concluded to ensure only qualified proponents are eligible to bid on the project tender. The process was open to all firms and rated the firm's understanding of project, corporate qualifications, team experience, project delivery, and comparable projects. Of seven interested proponents, four were deemed eligible by the review committee. Generally, there was a mixture of local/national firms in both qualified and non-qualified groups.
- Comprehensive drawing review is underway to ensure all specifications are captured to reduce cost and schedule risks during construction. After this is completed, the project will be ready to proceed to tender (expected in Dec/Jan)
