MERRY AND BRIGHT CHALLENGE
• The fourth annual challenge as a part of Light Up Riverview was held with 31 participating residents (88 in 2023, 48 in 2022) and 28 businesses (29 in 2023, 41 in 2022). Gift cards to local bakeries were awarded to residents in December.
SKATEPARK
<ul> <li>Increased Visitors: December saw a steady stream of new visitors to the park, including out-of-town guests from cities like Saint John, Halifax, Stratford PEI, and Toronto.</li> <li>Holiday Hoopla: Held on December 8, this festive event featured free admission, holiday treats, and tree decorations by Sonya Desroches and Alison Hill. A customer-donated tree allowed staff to create displays in both the entryway and youth centre, complemented by outdoor decorations set up for Light Up Riverview.</li> <li>Ride Assist Program: Several transportation passes were issued to youth, reducing barriers and enabling participation in activities with their peers.</li> <li>Preparations for the Frozen Open on February 1 are well underway. Several sponsors have already submitted payments, while others opted to wait until 2025 due to budget cycles. Ross finalized the poster, event page, and trophy designs prior to the holidays, aligning with the broader Winter Carnival promotion efforts.</li> </ul>
