Section 2: Status of Department's/Section's Operational Priorities for 2017

Priority	Status
Tenders	Mill Creek Nature Park Work is almost complete to determine specifications required to complete work at Mill Creek Nature Park in 2018. Upon re-evaluation of the required work related to trail construction, it has been determined that a portion of this work can be completed in-house, in cooperation with the Engineering and Public Works Department. This decision has necessitated changes to the scope of work required, and the resulting tender documents. Once complete, the tender will be posted to NBON.
	Wellness Centre The Request for Proposals for the selection of a consultant to assist the Town with fundraising activities related to the proposed Wellness Centre has been posted to NBON, with a closing date of April 6 th , 2018.

Welcoming	Staff are hard at work finalizing bookings for the Summer Concert Series and other summer
Community	events including Sunfest, Canada Day, block parties, and Party in the Park. In keeping with the

	Town's new branding, attracting partners with similarly focussed values, such as the Fundy Biosphere to support and sponsor events, continues to be a priority.
	Community Garden A Community Garden Committee meeting is scheduled for late March to discuss plans and directions for 2018. This year will see the hiring of a student Community Garden facilitator. The Town received a Summer Work Experience Green Jobs Initiative grant through the Canadian Parks & Recreation Association, funding 50% of the wages for this position. With respect to the planting beds rented to date, the raised beds have 13 of 20 rented while in- ground plots have 19 of 40 rented.
	Art Procurement Committee The Art Procurement Committee met to discuss the ongoing role of the committee (i.e. organizing art shows or purchasing art from pre-existing shows within the Town), with no decisions taken and discussion ongoing. Also addressed was the appropriate display of purchased art work in Council Chambers. The recently purchased photographs have been delivered to a local business to be matted and framed. The next meeting is scheduled for late March.
Planning for the Future	PCMAC Staffing A meeting was hosted with the Human Resources Department and the Communications Coordinator to begin the development of a long term recruitment and retention model for the aquatic centre. This meeting helped identify our employment "target market," the creation of a recruitment video clip and print advertising.
Smart and Sustainable Growth	PCMAC Program Development Pool staff contacted daycare & homeschool groups from Jan 1st to Mar 1 st , to assist in building Fall 2018 daytime programming. The result was that recent changes to the provincial legislation governing daycares, has significantly increased staff to child ratios for early childhood education centres visiting swimming pools. This will result in a significant decline in daycares using the aquatic centre for out trips and extended education programs (swimming lessons).

Section 3: Other Notable Development & Highlights for Council's Attention

*Jumpstart:

In 2005, Riverview P.R.O. Kids, along with many other similar programs across the country, became recipients of funds from the Canadian Tire Jumpstart Program to help pay for children to participate in recognized sports. Since 2005, Riverview P.R.O. Kids has received over \$150,000 that has been used to provide opportunities for Riverview children to participate in sports.

Last year, Jumpstart made the decision to no longer funnel funds through programs like P.R.O. Kids, but, rather, to give the funds directly to the sport organizations. This decision was to help increase the exposure of the Jumpstart program, as many organizations and families across Canada did not understand that Jumpstart was responsible for providing the funds for their child to attend their

particular sport. Jumpstart still requires the assistance of organizations like P.R.O. Kids, who are rooted in the communities they serve, to process applications and answer questions from parents and sports groups on a local level. It makes sense that all applications stemming from Riverview are reviewed and processed from one central point of contact to ensure that the funds (P.R.O. Kids funds and Jumpstart alike) are fairly distributed among residents.

Because the two funding programs are now separated, the reporting will be separated going forward, with a total of the two programs noted, so that the larger impact to the community can be captured.

A quick reference to point out the differences between the two programs:

It should also be noted that where a registration fee exceeds the maximum allowed through Jumpstart, a family who has received approval from Jumpstart for \$300 towards their registration may also apply to Riverview P.R.O. Kids to have the difference covered. For example: Hockey registration is \$450.

Families with an income below the low income cut off scale may have a very difficult time coming up with the remaining \$150 to go towards their child's hockey registration fee.

Staff Development

The Aquatic Coordinator along with other Town staff attended the "Safety in Action Conference" (hosted by Dekra). This is an international conference to educate participants about safety leadership and other relevant workplace safety topics.
