Welcoming	The 10 <sup>th</sup> Annual Riverview <b>Maple Sugar Festival</b> was held April 6th-9th, 2018. The highlights:

Partnered with 10 businesses to offer 10 different maple experiences in Riverview throughout the weekend.

Six brand new events offered. (Pickle Ball Tournament, Secrets of the Fundy Footpath Tour, Maple Bath-bomb Workshop, Rug Hooking Workshop, Candyland, and 10 ways to get your maple on).

Over 50% increase in attendees to the various Maple events and experiences offered this year estimated at 2,500.

#### **PCMAC Community Events**

The underwater themed swim (April 7th), in conjunction with Maple Festival, saw an approximate attendance of 120. Children were asked to provide 3 facts about their favourite underwater creature to gain free admission (regular admission was charged for adults). There was a lot of participation in this activity, with some children arriving with print-outs of their favourite sea creatures.

#### **PCMAC Programs**

The Spring 2018 swimming session has the largest number of registrants and gross revenue to date. This is primarily due to an increase in program quality and a longer session length (12 weeks). With the beginning of summer aquatic registration now occurring earlier (March 27<sup>th</sup>), indications are that there will be a predicted increase in summer registrants. Feedback has been positive to this change.

#### **Art Procurement Committee**

The recently purchased artwork by the procurement committee has been placed in council chambers. There is one final item to have matted and reframed.

#### **Friends of Mill Creek Committee**

The Friends of Mill creek Committee met in March to discuss future plans. Several members have left the committee due to time constraints. The committee is developing a list of potential candidates for these positions. Committee members are investigating new initiatives for programming including all season Fat biking, disc golf and having a section of the park designated as a "Night Sky" site by the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada (RASC). As well, members are planning for several tree plantings, another Bio-blitz by students of Riverview High and investigating the potential of planting indigenous wild flowers in the parks open spaces to enhance the proliferation of bird and insect life such as the local bee population. The next meeting is scheduled for May 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### **Community Garden Committee**

The Community Garden Committee meeting in March/April addressed the potential for "a little library" which would be dedicated to food growing and other related topics, placed on site. Also discussed was the introduction of theme gardens, (i.e. pizza garden, salsa garden). And the donation of communal plantings to the Foodbank. We also discussed the gardens soil condition and needed improvements it as it. To date, 16 of 20 raised beds and- 21 of 40 Inground plots have been rented. The Community Garden Committee will be hosting an information session at the Riverview Library on May 8th.

Planning for the Future	Fall 2018 Programming As a follow-up from meetings regarding the direction of the Fall 2018 & Winter 2019 pool programs, some new items are actively being researched. These additions include:  Mono-fin or Mermaid Swimming Lessons.  Increases to current program offerings with a reduction of class sizes.  Integration during group lessons for those that need assistance (additional instructor working 1 on 1 with a participant in a class setting).  A designated swim for those with exceptionalities. The swim would provide an unstructured play environment for children and their families. Aquatic staff would be
	on hand to facilitate learning skills when children are comfortable and ready.
Smart and Sustainable Growth	During Maple Sugar Festival's Rise & Maple event at the Dobson Trail, participants were requested to bring their own mugs for refreshments. There were approximately 150 people who did, which saved using at least an equal number of styrofoam cups.

Section 3: Other Notable Development & Highlights for Council's Attention

#### **Staff Development**

Staff attended the following learning opportunities in March/Early April:

March 6th-9th: Sport Events Congress (hosted by the Canadian Sport Tourism Association): bringing municipalities, sponsors, sporting event rights holders and tourism associations together to review current issues, trends and opportunities.

March 23rd: Recreation New Brunswick focus group was hosted in Fredericton. Delegates from recreation departments and organizations met to discuss and identify training and resource needs. This information will be used by RecreationNB to development a set of future priorities. The predominant themes were: safety training for all employee levels, risk management, lifecycle planning and facility planning.

April 10th/11th: Both full time aquatic staff attended the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Canadian Red Cross Atlantic Swimposium. This 2-day event included keynote speakers from across Canada and several certification workshops such as, "Psychological First Aid and Respectful Education: Anti-Bully Campaign". A large number of supervisory staff from around the Maritimes attended to discuss common trends and challenges in the aquatic industry.
